

# Maciej Nowicki and the Architect's Trace

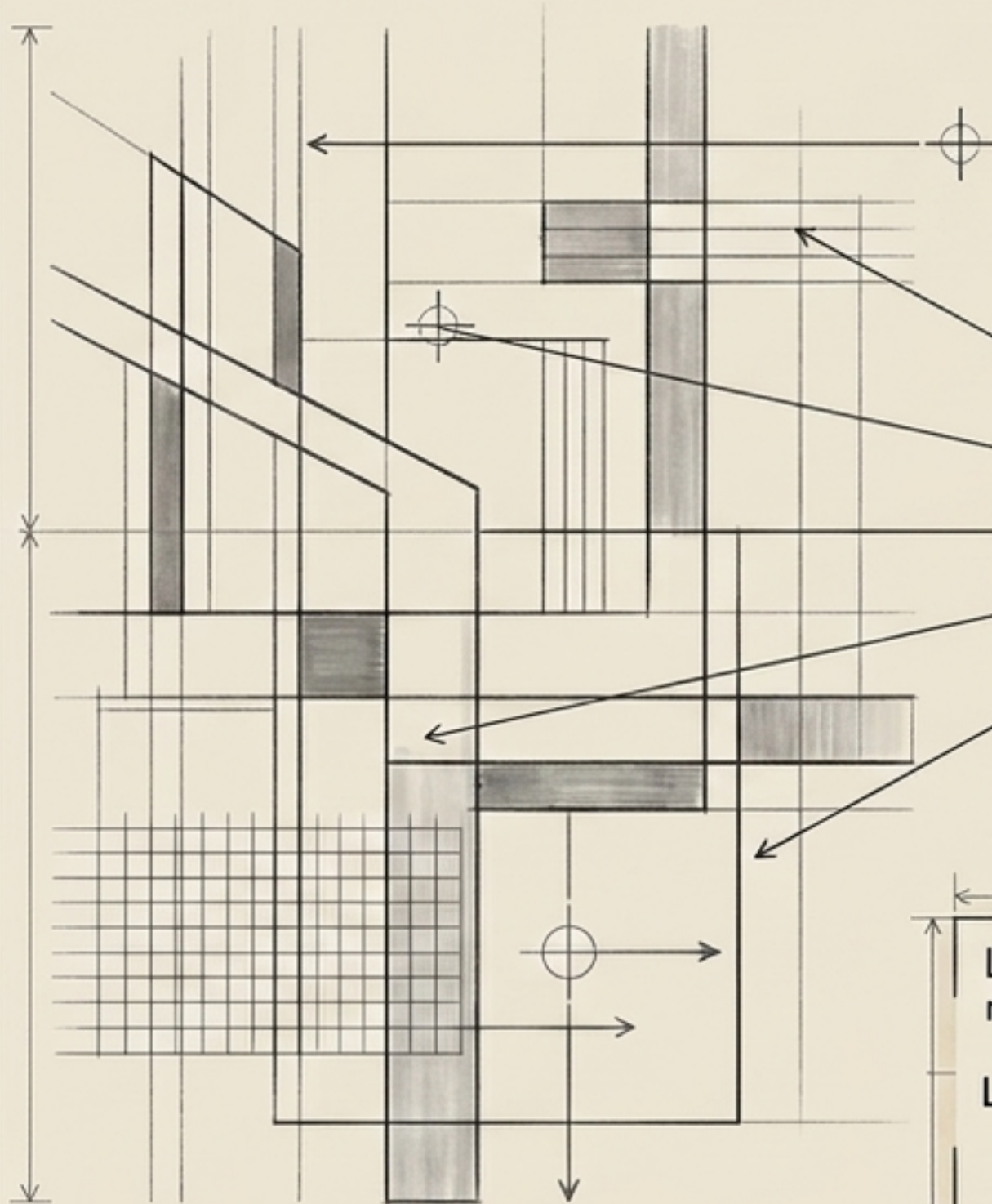
The brief life and monumental vision of the pioneer who reshaped 20th-century architecture.

## The Wright Influence: Organic Sensibility

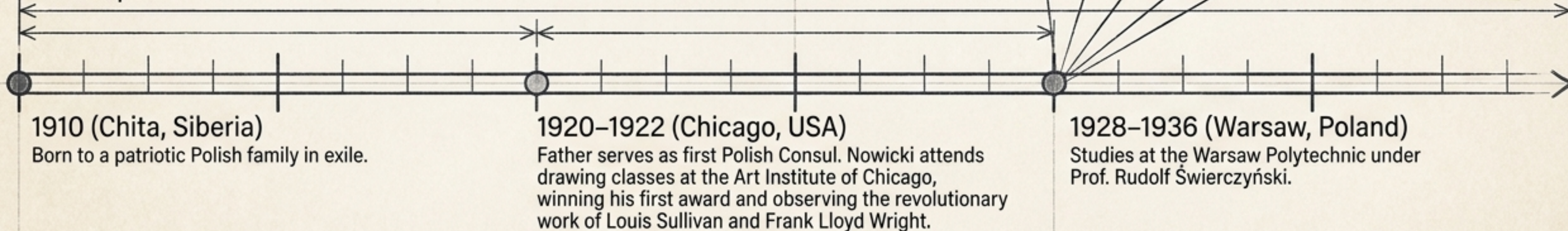

# Designing in the Shadows of Occupation

## The Underground Resistance

- **Military Role:** Fought as an anti-aircraft Artillery Officer, then served (nom de guerre "Nowina") in the Home Army's 7th District "Obroza". During the Warsaw Uprising in 1944 was a Liaison Officer of the "Kampinos" Group. Designed the secret banner for the 1st Polish Independent Parachute Brigade.
- **Academic Defiance:** Continued to teach architecture clandestinely despite the occupying forces closing the Warsaw Polytechnic.

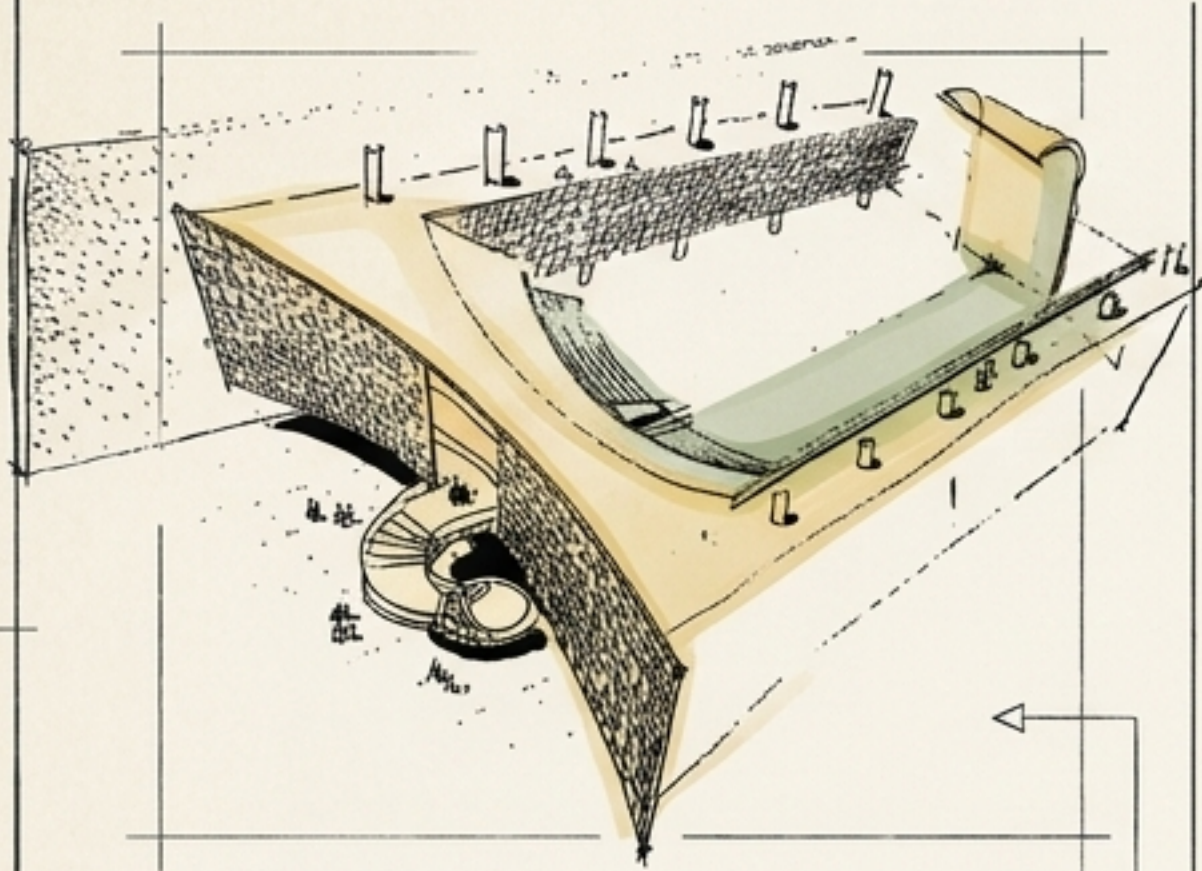

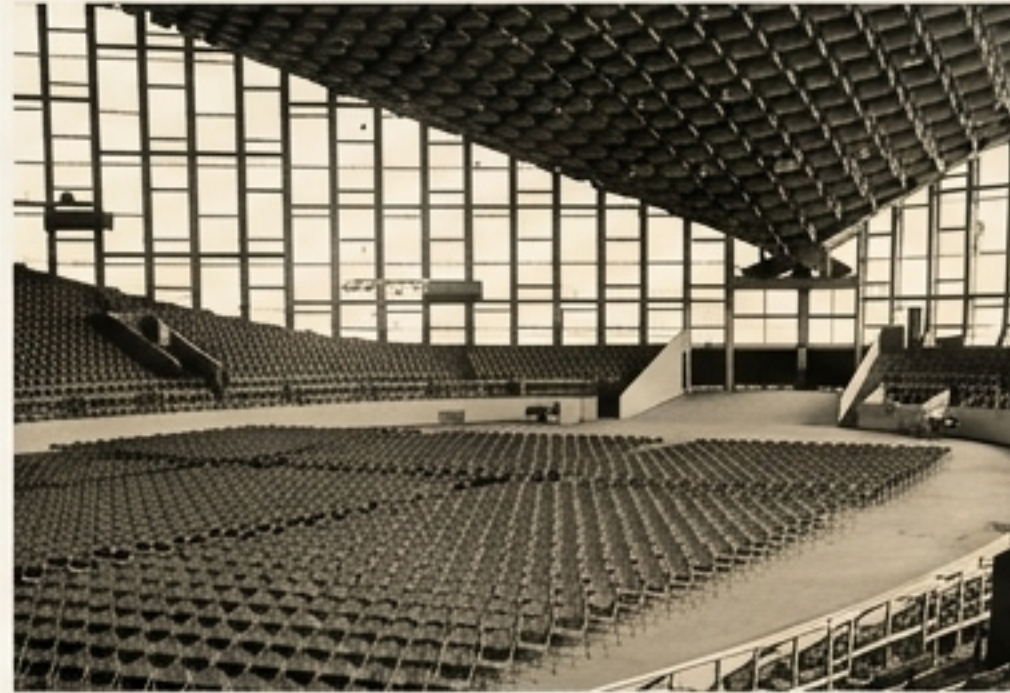

# Four Years, Three Global Masterpieces



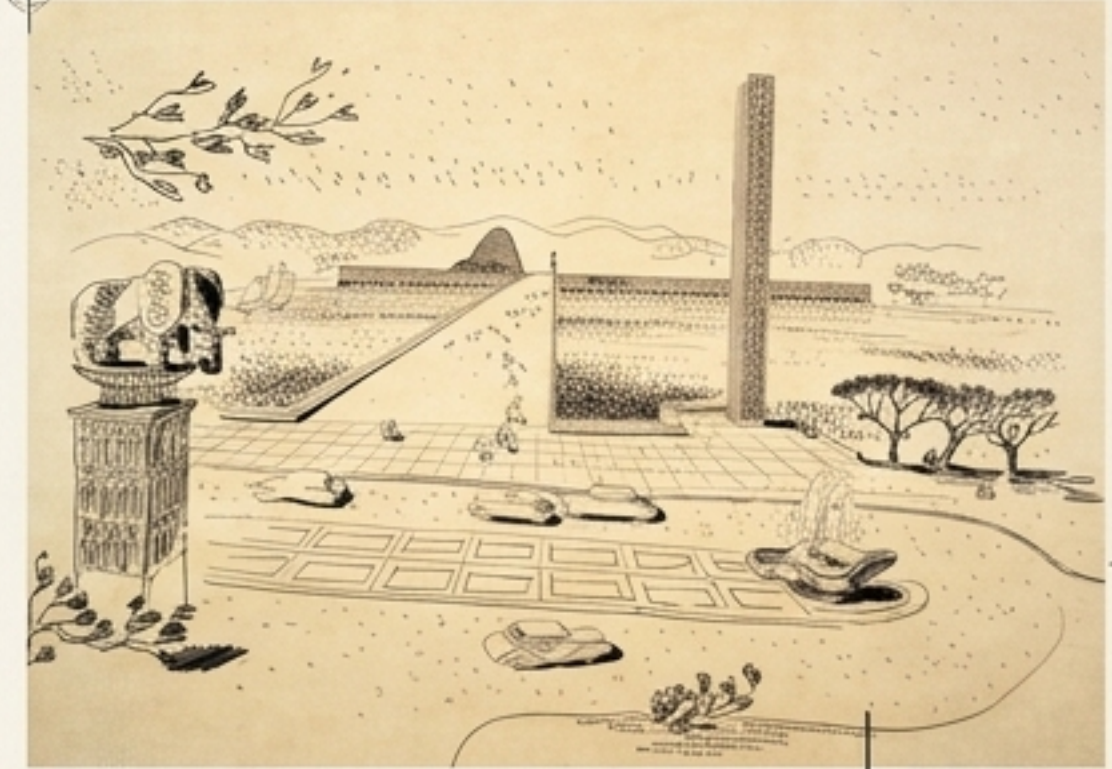
## United Nations Headquarters (New York)

- **Role:** Polish Consultant to the UN Planning Commission.
- **Legacy:** Collaborated with Le Corbusier and Niemeyer; resulted in his exile from communist Poland.



## The Paraboleum (Raleigh)

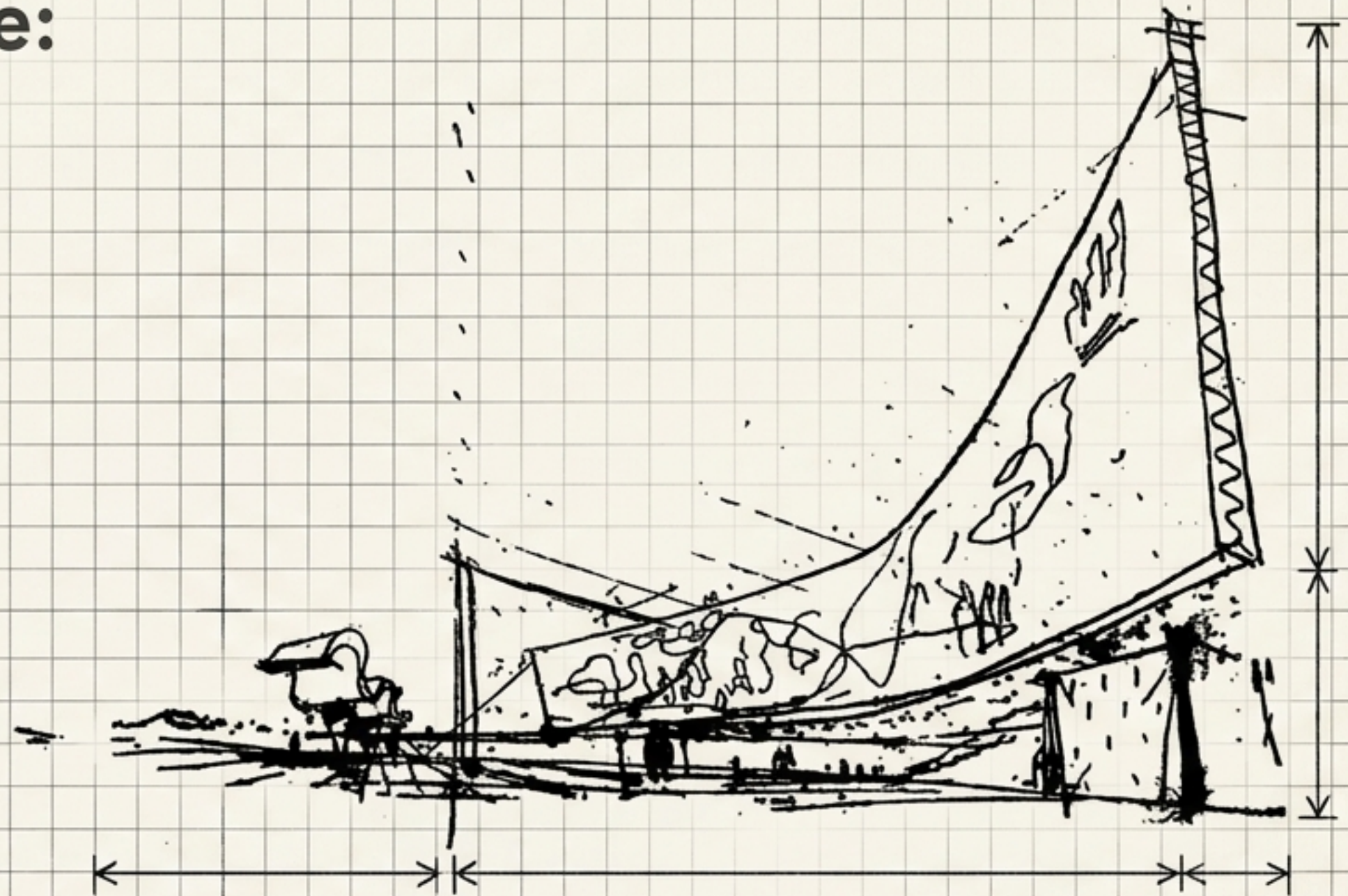
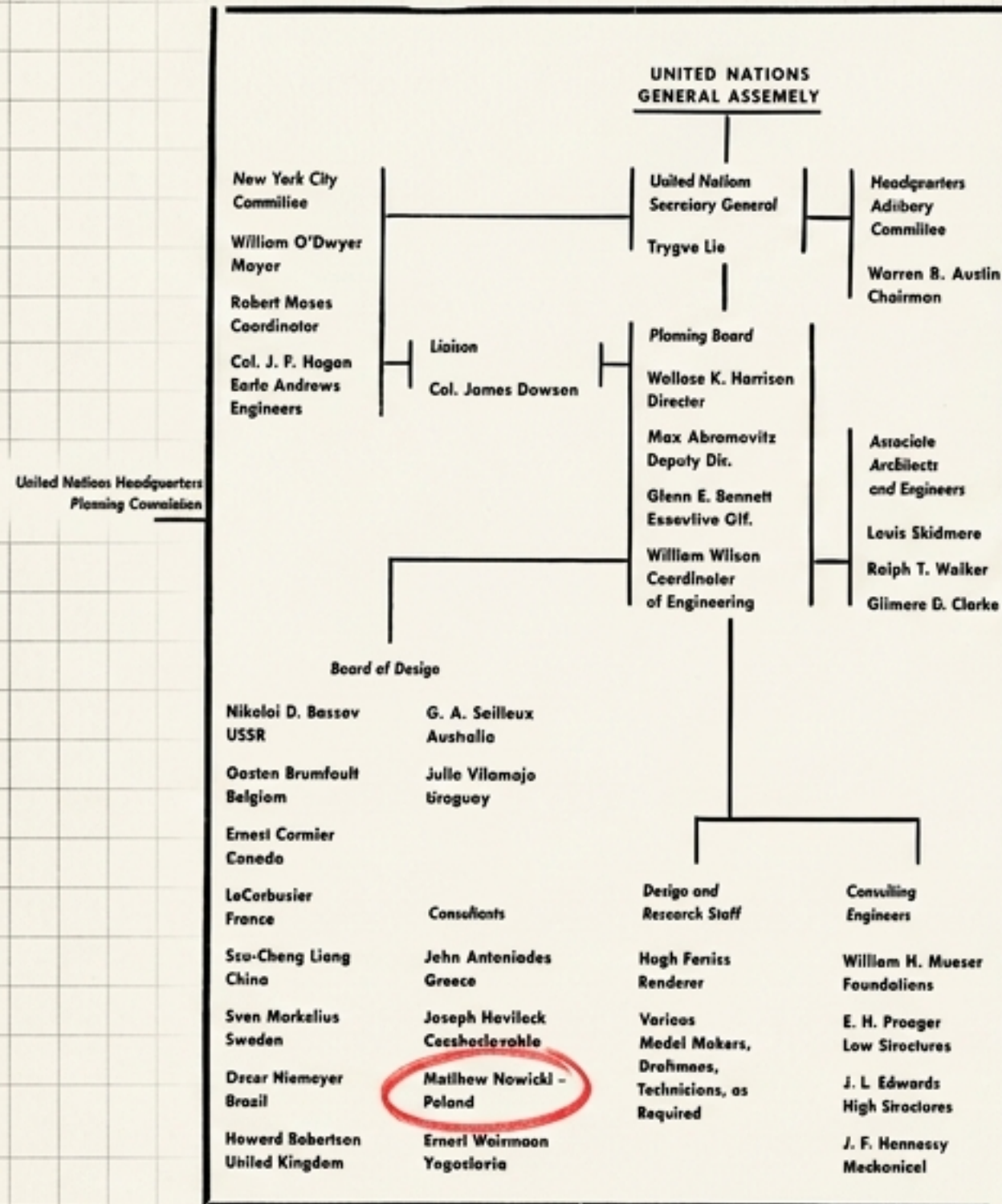
- Role:** Head Architect (Dept. of Architecture, NC State).
- Legacy:** World's first parabolic hyperboloid; won AIA award for best architectural work.



## Chandigarh Masterplan (India)

- Role:** Co-developer with Albert Mayer.
- Legacy:** Pioneered organic urbanism for a newly independent nation's capital.

# Shaping the Global Stage: The UN Headquarters



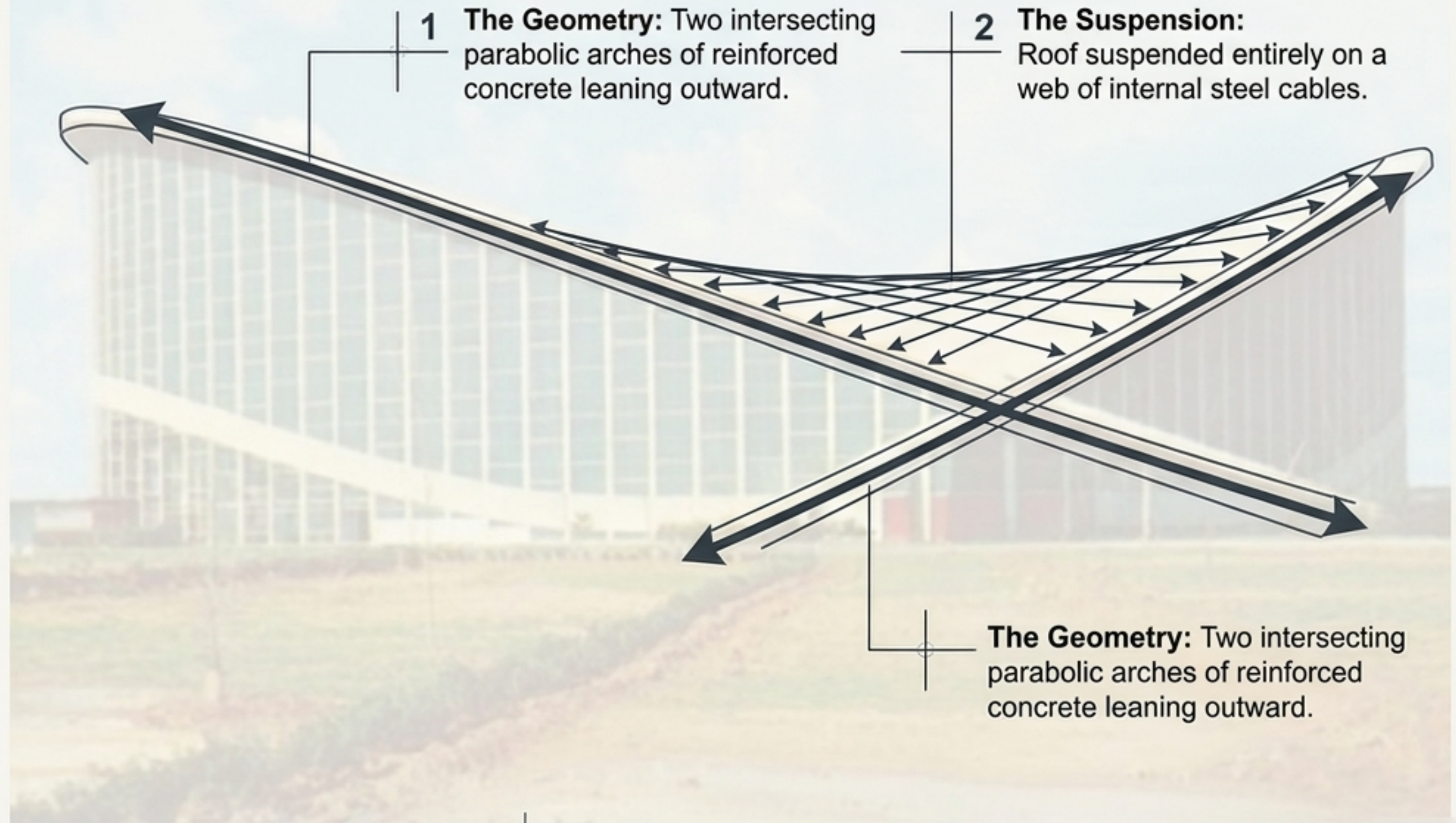
The Assignment: Appointed as the Polish consultant to design the UN headquarters, collaborating alongside Le Corbusier, Oscar Niemeyer, and Sven Markelius.

The Sacrifice: Due to the birth of his second child and his flourishing practice, Nowicki chose to remain in the US. Consequently, the communist authorities censored his name, erasing him from Polish public life for decades.

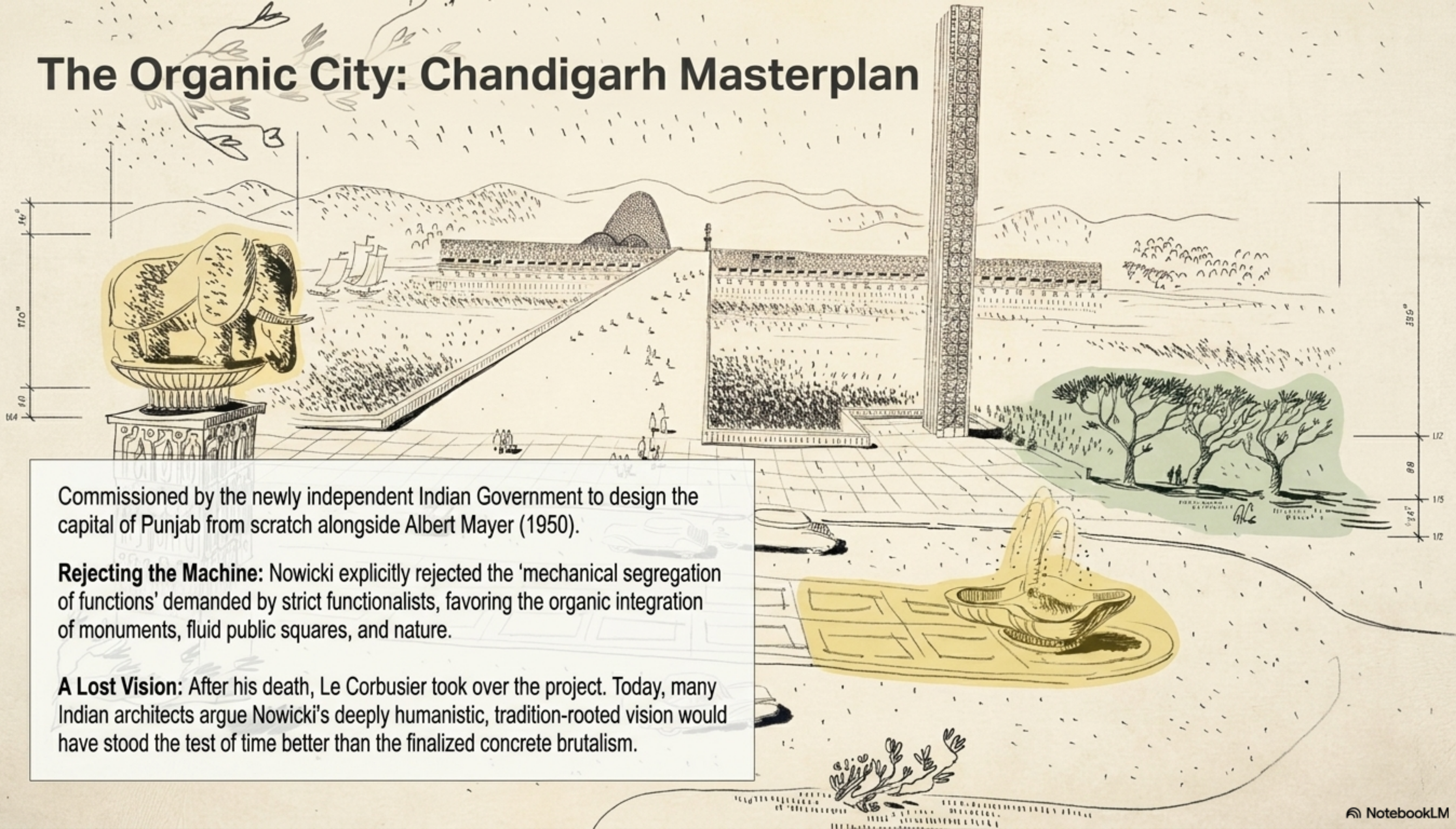
# Breaking Gravity: The Invention of the Paraboleum

**The Breakthrough:** The design completely departed from the ancient principle of column and architrave.

**The Impact:** The world's first parabolic hyperboloid roof. This engineering marvel paved the way for future legends like Eero Saarinen, Kenzō Tange, and Frei Otto.



# The Organic City: Chandigarh Masterplan



Commissioned by the newly independent Indian Government to design the capital of Punjab from scratch alongside Albert Mayer (1950).

**Rejecting the Machine:** Nowicki explicitly rejected the 'mechanical segregation of functions' demanded by strict functionalists, favoring the organic integration of monuments, fluid public squares, and nature.

**A Lost Vision:** After his death, Le Corbusier took over the project. Today, many Indian architects argue Nowicki's deeply humanistic, tradition-rooted vision would have stood the test of time better than the finalized concrete brutalism.

# An Unfinished Blueprint

## ***Airliner Crash in Egypt Kills 55; 23 of the Victims Were Americans***

**DIST EL ASHRAFF, Egypt,** Aug. 31—A Trans World Airlines Constellation crashed and burned in the desert sands on the western edge of the Nile Delta today. - • On August 31, 1950, returning to the US from his work in India, Maciej Nowicki died tragically in a plane crash over the Libyan Desert. He was 40 years old.
- His brilliant wife, Stanisława Sandecka-Nowicka, survived him to become the first female professor of architecture in the US.
- • Because of political censorship, his massive contributions were suppressed in his native Poland until 1956, leaving his symbolic grave in Warsaw largely unknown to the broader public.



# The Pioneer of the Late 20th Century

*“If time had allowed his genius to spread its wings in full, this poet-philosopher of form would would have influenced the whole course of ancrite as profoundly as he inspired his friends.”*

L'Architecture d'Aujourd'hui rightly named him “a pioneer of architecture of the second half of the 20th century.” Though his life was cut short, Maciej Nowicki's trace remains eternally visible in the curved roofs, suspended arenas, and human-centric spaces of the modern world.
